

How to lodge a protection visa application (ImmiAccount)

This fact sheet is for people who arrived to Australia by plane on a valid visa, and would like to lodge a protection visa application to seek asylum in Australia.

Currently the process to do this is via the Department's website platform "ImmiAccount".

If you don't have a passport, you will need to request permission to apply using paper forms.

If you have a passport, you will generally be expected to lodge your application online.

This fact sheet sets out how to do this, step by step.

Log in to your ImmiAccount

Screen 8: Members of the family unit not applying for protection.

This asks if you have a spouse or children (anywhere in the world), who are not applying for protection in Australia at the same time as you.

Screen 9: Other family and contacts

Screen 10: Contact details



You must enter a residential address (not a PO Box address) otherwise the application will be invalid. You can change your address as soon as you lodge the application, and anytime while the application is being considered.

You will need to enter all previous addresses for the past 20 years. Unfortunately the ImmiAccount will not allow "overlapping" times for the addresses, or any dates to be left blank.

If your address history will not fit adequately within the data collection boxes, you can upload an address history as a word document, and just write "see attached / Sydney / 2000" from your date of birth until whenever you started living at your current address.

Screen 17: Travel to Australia and travel documents

This asks you whether your passport is still valid or whether it has expired, how you got your passport.

It asks you if you've ever had a passport lost or stolen.

It asks you the date you left your home country (on your way to Australia), the airport your left from, and which passport you used. It should prepopulate to allow you to select the details of your passport you entered earlier.

It asks you the date you arrived in Australia, which airport you landed at, and whether you came as a visitor, a student, or the type of visa you arrived on.

Screen 20: Travel history

This is where you need to disclose which other countries, apart from Australia and your home country, that you have been to in the past thirty (30) years.

You'll need to put at a minimum, the month and the year that you were there. If you know the exact date, you can put that. If you don't know, you will have to nominate a month and a year to progress. You can put "January" as the month if you are not sure, and then make a note of this in any statement you upload.



Screen 21: Employment history

This is where you need to disclose your paid employment, as well as any periods where you weren't working. A typical example might be from your date of birth until your first job "supported by my parents", then from your first job onwards the details of those jobs in as much detail as you know, and then from the time of your arrival in Australia onwards, either "unemployed – seeking asylum", or the details of any work you have done in Australia since your arrival.

Screen 23: Reasons for claiming protection

You also are then asked to promise to tell the Department if you change your contact details while the application is being considered.

Recommended documents to upload include your passport if genuine, (if possible a full colour copy of every page), any identity documents you have from your home country (which do not have any errors on them of any kind), and a statement setting out more detail about your protection claim. Any documents not in English should be translated (see below).

You can upload additional documents after you submit your application, so if you are not sure about a document, get advice about it first and upload it later.

You should not provide the Department with any documents that are not genuine

If you give the Department of Home Affairs a bogus document as evidence of your identity, nationality or citizenship, your visa application may be refused. A bogus document is a document that wasn't issued to you, is counterfeit, has been altered without authorisation, or was obtained because of a false or misleading statement.

Make payment

Once you click on submit, you will then be taken to the payment screen, where you will have to enter details of the credit card to make payment, the PayPal or BPAY. The credit cards the Department accepts are: MasterCard, VISA, American Express, Diners Club, JCB.

It does not have to be your credit card to make a payment. But whenever a debit/credit card is used, you will need to enter the address of the cardholder (as held by the financial institution). The bank may ask the cardholder to authorise payment via a code sent to their mobile phone or email address before



payment can go through, so if you are using someone else's card, please make sure they are available when you make payment.

What happens after I lodge?

After you submit the application, you will usually receive a letter of acknowledgment and a bridging visa grant within up to six weeks. Sometimes the Department experiences delays here, so don't worry if this does not take place immediately. The important thing is to respond once they do send you this notice via the email address you have nominated.

You will also receive a request to attend a "biometrics" appointment – usually fingerprints and a photo and bring your original passport (if genuine) with you. If you don't attend this appointment, your application will be found invalid. It is important that you attend this appointment.
